Snacks: The kids can bring in a daily snack from home.



Our new school guidelines call for "fruit or vegetables "in their own skin". Though other snacks may be brought for lunch, the classroom will follow those guidelines. I appreciate your help and understanding. As well, our class is a "nut-free" class, so I've required that students only bring in snacks free of any nut products.

I also allow each child a water bottle (please only water) by their desk. My requirement is that the bottle stays under the desk and not on top, so as not to be a distraction (or a leaky mess!).

Homework:

Homework is an integral part of fifth grade.

The homework assigned is a reinforcement to classwork and not doing the homework will result in a lesser understanding of that work. As a general rule of thumb, an evening's homework should be able to be completed in 45-60 minutes. This means 45-60 focused, undistracted minutes. Some nights, it may be more, many, it may be less. Please help provide a quiet, well lit place for them to be able to do their best job.

If your child is consistently taking more time than this, then the HW is not serving its purpose, and <u>I'd like you to let me know</u>. Homework is not serving its intended purpose if it is creating constant frustration.

Please, be there to help answer questions when they have them, but let the work reflect their effort. Please ask if you have any questions regarding this.

When homework is not turned in on time, they will attend "Finish It". This is a program designed as a natural consequence, in which students with either a missing or incomplete assignment will stay in during lunch recess. A pattern of not turning in homework can also result in a parent conference.

The assignments are written clearly on the board and reviewed daily, and should be recorded in the assignment notebook. I check these when I can, but ultimately, it is your child's responsibility to write down the homework and bring the notebook to and from school.

Though I don't ask for a reading log to be kept, it is my expectations that each student read at least 20 minutes a night.

If for some reason (and being a parent, I do realize this happens!) homework could not be completed, please send in a signed (by the parent) excuse. I will ask the student to still make up the homework if necessary.

Classroom Expectations and Consequences

We come to school ready to learn.

This, from the Patton handbook, really says it all. Everything really falls under this. On our first day of class, I let the kids know that this classroom will be a safe learning environment for every student in the class. The expectations in the class need to meet that requirement.

As a class, we have discussed and agreed upon the following classroom rules:

- 1) Be kind
- 2) Work hard
- 3) Show responsibility
- 4) Ask questions
- 5) Be aware of your surroundings

Ignoring/not following expectations (after a reminder) will result in a missed recess (which includes an opportunity to reflect on your behavior) and a pattern of missed recesses will result in a parent phone call/conference.

One of the keys to a successful classroom (as in life!) is flexibility. I know that things come up which may change some of our routines, or your routines! I'll let you know when changes happen here, and please let me know when changes happen for you that may affect your child at school.

School Wide Reading
